The Library of Congress National American Woman Suffrage Association Collection, 1848–1921

The National American Woman Suffrage Association Collection consists of 167 digital and/or text versions of books, pamphlets, and other artifacts documenting the suffrage campaign. They are a subset of the library's larger collection donated by Carrie Chapman Catt, the long-time president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, in November 1938. The collection includes works from the libraries of other members and officers of the organization, including Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Susan B.
